

New Jersey's NAEP Report Card 2024

The National Assessment of Educational Progress, or NAEP, is a test given to a representative sample of students in every state in Grades 4 and 8.

Understanding NAEP

Q: When it comes to NAEP, or the Nation's Report Card, just how high is high achievement?

Only one state group — Massachusetts' 4th grade math students — showed more than half of students (51%) proficient. All other overall state proficiency rates fell below 50%.

Q: How well did the state of New Jersey do on NAEP?

New Jersey ranked #2 in the country in 3 of the 4 tests administered but to put that in perspective, that translated to only 38% of 4th grade students being proficient in reading, meaning most are unprepared for success.

Q: We hear a lot about reading; how are New Jersey's students doing in mathematics?

Overall, New Jersey's scores have declined. Since 2013, our 8th grade math proficiency has dropped by 9% and in 4th grade, proficiency scores have dipped by 5%.



Q: From what we can see in NAEP data, what is the biggest factor influencing student success?

Economic status is the strongest predictor of student success in New Jersey, so it is often a student's zip code that determines their academic future.

Q: Is it fair or realistic to expect economically disadvantaged kids to really improve?

Yes! The data makes this clear. For example, New Jersey is one of America's wealthiest states, yet several of our country's poorest states — Mississippi, Louisiana, Kentucky, and South Carolina — now have a higher percentage of economically disadvantaged 4th graders reading proficiently than we do.

Also, Florida's economically disadvantaged 4th graders are outscoring their New Jersey counterparts by a whopping eleven (11) points in Math.

Q: Which state had this year's best report card, and is there anything we can learn from them?

Louisiana is a real winner because unlike consistently high-scoring states, Louisiana has seen considerable improvement. Their 4th graders had the highest reading growth nationwide for the second year in a row and their 4th graders' math scores are remarkably now four points higher than before the pandemic began. Louisiana also moved up twenty slots to improve its state ranking in 8th grade reading from 49th in 2019 to 29th in 2024.

Louisiana credits a steady focus on evidencebased reading, an emphasis on core skills in mathematics, and high-quality, high-dosage tutoring among the driving factors for their success.

Final Comments

New Jersey's NAEP scores are better than most in the country, however, we have a lot to learn — and do — to give every single child in our state, no matter their wealth status or any other demographic marker, a fighting chance at success.
